**Reporting sexual abuse of minors.** [The following notice is required to be published four times a year in both English and Spanish in compliance with the USCCB *Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People*.] To inform the Diocese of Grand Rapids of the sexual abuse of a minor by a priest, deacon, or other Church personnel and/or to speak with the Victim Assistance Coordinator, please call **243-0491**. A caller will be requested to provide his or her name and telephone number. All calls regarding complaints of sexual abuse will be returned in a timely manner. The Diocese is committed to protect children, young people, and other vulnerable people in our schools, parishes, and ministries. As an alternative, a report may be made to the Family Independence Agency for the applicable county.

**Denunciando abuso sexual de menores.** Para informar a la Diócesis de Grand Rapids sobre el abuso sexual cometido contra un menor por parte de un sacerdote, diácono, o personal de la Iglesia o para contactar al coordinador de la asistencia para víctimas (Victim Assistance Coordinator), por favor llame al **243-0491**. A quien llame se le solicitará que provea su nombre y número telefónico. Todas las llamadas en referencia a una queja sobre abuso sexual serán atendidas con prontitud. La diócesis está comprometida a proteger a la niñez y a la juventud así como a otras personas vulnerables en nuestras escuelas, parroquias, y ministerios. Como una alternativa la denuncia puede ser hecha a la Department of Human Services del condado correspondiente.
